IHSAA TO INDUCT THREE INTO HALL OF FAME

The Idaho High School Activities Association's Hall of Fame annually honors individuals who have given many years of exemplary service to Idaho's youth. Three such individuals will be inducted as the Hall of Fame Class of 2025. Terry Beck (Eagle), Tim Perrigot (Wendell) and Steve Sosnowski (Capital) will be honored at ceremonies during the 45th annual Hall of Fame banquet Wednesday, August 6th, 6:30 p.m. at the Boise Centre in downtown Boise. Ticket information will be posted on the IHSAA website in June.

Other awards to be presented at the banquet include the Dick Fleischmann Memorial Award, the Wes Lowe Memorial Award and the Duane D. Wolfe Memorial Award. Distinguished Service Awards for each of the six activity districts, the Spirit of Sport Award and Official of the Year will also be presented. Those recipients will be announced at a later date.

Hall of Fame - Class of 2025

Terry Beck, Eagle

Starting as a teacher and coach in 1980, Terry Beck held impactful roles in school districts across Oregon and Idaho, including leadership at Boise High, Mountain Home, and most notably, 20 years as Principal of Eagle High School. At Eagle, he led major facility upgrades and fostered strong community partnerships, earning the school over a dozen IHSAA "School of Excellence" awards.

Beck also made a significant mark at the state level, serving 25 years on the Third District Board of Control, including two decades as President. His leadership helped shape numerous IHSAA State Championships, and he's served as meet director for the 4A/5A State Track Meet for the past 12 years.

Recognized with awards such as the IHSAA Dick Fleischmann Memorial Award (2020) and District I Coach of the Year (1987), Beck's work extended beyond sports, influencing academic and extracurricular excellence across Idaho. Through every role, he upheld the belief that "It's about students first."

Terry Beck's legacy continues through the countless students, families, and educators he inspired with his compassion, leadership, and commitment to creating positive, lasting change.

Tim Perrigot, Wendell

Dr. Perrigot began his career in 1992, serving in roles ranging from science teacher and football coach to principal and superintendent. He spent over 20 years at Minico High School, leading the football team to 120+ wins, 9 conference titles, and 14 playoff appearances. Most recently, he served as Superintendent of Wendell School District from 2018 to 2025.

His leadership extended across the state as a longtime IHSAA Executive Board member and President. He also directed key events such as the State Track Meet and the Magic Valley Shrine All-Star Football Game.

With numerous awards to his name—including IAAA Athletic Director of the Year and ISCA State Football Coach of the Year—Dr. Perrigot is known for his values of Faith, Family, and Fun, and for shaping thousands of student-athletes with integrity and purpose.

The IHSAA honors Dr. Tim Perrigot for his incredible impact and lifelong dedication to Idaho's youth.

Steve Sosnowski, Capital

A teacher, coach, and athletic director at Firth, Meridian, and Capital High Schools, Sosnowski is known for his leadership, mentorship, and dedication to student development. He directed numerous state and district tournaments and helped enhance programs and facilities throughout his career.

While accolades include induction into the Idaho Athletic Administrators Association Hall of Fame (2023) and Capital High School Hall of Fame (2024), Sosnowski says the true reward is the lasting relationships built along the way.

"I've always believed in using high school activities to build character, teach life lessons, and bring people together," he said.
