CONSENT AGENDA

Chad Williams reviewed the financial report, noting that with only 30 days into the fiscal year, the data is still limited. Some percentages appear higher than expected due to expenses from conferences attended and the timing of certain bill payments (Pages 9-12).

Tonia Burk moved, Tyler Johnson seconded to approve the consent agenda which included the Balance Sheet, Financial Report from July 1st, 2025, to July 31st, 2025, and the IHSAA Board of Directors actions via phone or email.

REPORT ITEMS

YEA

Julie Hamons gave an update on the YEA, reporting that they closed the fiscal year on June 30 with over \$5.5 million—an increase of \$424,000 from the previous year. The dividend distribution totaled \$193,106 plus \$27,000 split between all vested schools. This is up \$15,000 from 2023-24. This marks the second year of a 0.5% distribution shared among fully vested schools. Checks are being issued back to those schools, while the remaining funds will be reinvested into schools that are not yet fully vested. Payette and Madison are now fully vested, bringing the total number of vested schools to 84. Julie also discussed the Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) program, which allows funds to be directed to the YEA from IRAs. Schools that host jamborees will receive QCD data and materials to share at the events as part of continued outreach efforts (Page 13).

Marketing

Chad Williams shared that Brandon Riley has been added to the team as a marketing representative. Brandon introduced himself, highlighting his career background and his joint role supporting both Idaho and Utah. He spoke about a sheet that outlines the current sponsors of Idaho athletics and emphasized the importance of supporting these partners. He encouraged everyone to do so and expressed his willingness to meet with anyone interested in getting involved or offering support (Page 14).

Officials Report: Officials by Sport (July 2025)

Chad Williams reviewed the results of the officials report and noted that we are seeing an upward trend, expressing gratitude to both the officials and the board for their efforts. He acknowledged that the board has taken steps to make things easier for officials, and those changes are proving effective. It was mentioned at both the state and national level that if an official reaches their third year, they are likely to continue long term. Mike added that volleyball official numbers have increased in every district, indicating that their ongoing efforts are having a positive impact.

Financial Review

Chad Williams reported on the annual financial review conducted by an accounting firm. He noted that the fund balance is healthy and at the desired level; as a nonprofit, the goal is to maintain the balance rather than see significant increases or decreases. This year, the review included specific areas such as director travel pay and related expenses. The firm also audited 6A basketball ticket sales to confirm that the number of tickets sold matched the number of attendees. Overall, it was a positive report.

Board Committees Assignments 2025-26

Chad Williams reported that the 2025-26 board committees have been updated with the new board members.

State Tournament

- **Tennis Seeding Survey-** Mike Federico shared an update on the tennis seeding survey, noting that the tennis coaches submitted a proposal regarding how tournament seeding should be handled. The survey was sent to 79 tennis coaches, but only 13 responded. As a result, the state tournament committee has requested that the survey be resent in hopes of receiving more responses by September.
- **3A State Softball-** Julie Hammons announced that the 3A State Softball tournament will be held at Timberlake and Lakeland, with Kellogg serving as the host school.
- **Future 6A/5A State Golf Date-** Julie Hammons addressed the ongoing difficulties in securing golf courses for tournaments. She explained that the 6A/5A golf season was originally moved to the fall due to better course availability, but courses are now reporting that fall scheduling has become problematic. This year's tournament dates are already set, with the 6A tournament scheduled for Thursday/Friday and the 5A tournament on Friday/Saturday. Looking ahead, starting after this fall, the 6A and 5A golf tournaments will shift to a Monday/Tuesday format. This adjustment has already been reflected in the five-year calendar.

2025 NFHS Summer Meeting

Chad Williams and Randy Lords both had very positive experiences at the 2025 NFHS Summer Meeting in Chicago, highlighting the valuable learning opportunities and excellent courses and speakers. Key topics discussed included working with the legislature, AI in athletics, classification, and representation. Tyler Johnson also mentioned the important insights that he learned on mentoring athletic directors and showed interest in developing mentorship plans moving forward. Chad also noted that Idaho faces challenges similar to those discussed at the conference, though the state is slightly behind a few others. Mike Federico emphasized the value of connecting and exchanging ideas with directors from other states. Additionally, Julie Hammons spoke about the National Women's Leadership initiative, which aims to increase the involvement of women in athletic leadership roles. She shared that the IAAA and IHSAA plan to begin outreach efforts to encourage and support women athletic directors. Overall, the meeting was successful and insightful for the IHSAA staff and board.

NFHS Student Leadership Summit

Chad Williams discussed attending the Student Leadership Summit in Indianapolis with four SAC students, saying they had a great time. He appreciated the opportunity to see what the summit offers and gain insight into the SAC students' work on a larger scale. The event provided a good balance of leadership training and fun. Chad enjoyed seeing what the students brought back, as they are the leaders of SAC. He mentioned that the IHSAA's only expense is the cost of their flights.

Student Advisory Council Retreat

Mike Federico talked about the SAC retreat held here, which was attended by 22 of 26 members. The senior students planned the retreat and incorporated ideas they learned at the NFHS summit. They are very excited about their "Gem State of Mind" project, which involves meeting with students from each school to introduce them to the program and the Captains Handbook. The group is actively developing the program and working toward its implementation. They also plan to hold a summit in the spring for younger students.

Julie Hammons gave an overview of Wednesday, August 6th, noting that the Schools of Excellence awards will be presented at the annual meeting, followed by the Hall of Fame ceremony later that evening.

2025 Administrative Workshops

Chad Williams shared details about the upcoming 2025 administrative workshops, reviewing the schedule and expressing his excitement to travel and connect with everyone in person (Page 15).

Media Days

Mike Federico provided an update on media days, noting that he travels to meet with media representatives to discuss rule changes, dispel rumors, and distribute media credentials. He reminded schools to review the new rules, emphasizing that school media credentials are limited to high school students and their advisors. Media passes are valid only for state tournaments; their use at regular games is at the discretion of the host school (Page 16).

Legends of the Game

Julie Hammons discussed the Legends of the Game nominations for basketball, which honor historic championship teams from around the state and will be presented during the state basketball tournaments. Nominations, due by September 10, will be reviewed and decided at the September meeting. Eligible girls' teams must have competed at least 20 years ago and boys' teams from 30 years ago. Nominations remain active for five years. She encouraged member schools to engage with their communities to identify deserving teams (Page 17).

Ballot Protocol

Chad Williams explained the ballot process for student hardship cases that require a board vote. Board members receive an automated email and have 48 hours to submit their vote. If a vote is not received within that time frame, Chad sends a reminder. After 72 hours, there are typically enough votes to reach a decision.

Eligibility Waiver Data

Chad Williams presented four years of data on hardship form decisions, noting that 60% of appeals have been approved. In that time, only three students have been denied participation, demonstrating the board's commitment to finding ways for students to be involved (Page 18).

Chad Williams discussed the upcoming board meeting where the Board reviews petitions. Schools will be assigned specific times to present their petitions, which are due by September 10th. While the schedule may be adjusted slightly depending on the number of submissions, it is expected to remain largely the same.

Board of Control Survey Results

Chad Williams reviewed the Board of Control survey results, which included five to six questions or scenarios to assess each of the board's responses. He noted that the BOC is responsible for applying penalties when rules are violated. The survey revealed consistent responses across districts, with similar consequences observed for rule violations in different regions (Pages 19-26).

Ford Idaho Center

- **August 15: City Council vote**
- **August 14: CWI Board vote**

Chad Williams discussed the Ford Idaho Center's transition from the city of Nampa to The College of Western Idaho management. He has spoken with representatives from both organizations, who assured him that operations for the IHSAA—including contracts and events—will remain unchanged. Chad noted that if CWI builds a facility in the parking lot, they would be required to provide alternative parking arrangements. Overall, he expressed confidence about moving forward with the transition.

Director's Committees

- **Transfer Rules Review-** Chad Williams reported that he oversees the Transfer Rules Committee, and they did not meet over the summer.

- **Track Proposals-** Chad Williams formed a committee to review proposals. Although the committee did not meet over the summer, they plan to meet before the September meeting.
- **100 Year Anniversary-** Julie Hammons announced a new logo commemorating the 100th anniversary of the IHSAA will be unveiled at the Hall of Fame banquet Aug 6th. She noted that the 100- year celebration committee will be finalized in early fall. She thanked Morgan Potter and MCUs, who contributed to the logo design. Members were encouraged to consider whether they would like to participate in the anniversary activities.

 - December 1, 2025: 26-28 representation will be determined

Chad Williams discussed Rule 2-3 and encouraged those interested in petitioning specific sports to submit their requests through the new process. The petition is now submitted online to simplify the process, and members are advised to review the form carefully to ensure proper completion. A reminder email was sent a few weeks ago with instructions. (Page 28-29).

ACTION ITEMS-FINAL READINGS

Wrestling in Moscow, Venue Cost, Coaches Survey , U of I Letter

Shawn Tieggs discussed that he and Chad are in active discussion with the University of Idaho about price of security and the ticketing for State Wrestling. No action taken.

Regular Membership Requirements

Julie Hammons discussed that there has been an increase of new member schools that are trying to join the IHAA. However, the schools aren't completely educated on the rules and processes of the association. The proposal requires new schools to be associate members for 2 years before they can become regular members. For new schools that are created as a branch from an already established school, those are excused.

**ARTICLE I.
MEMBERSHIP**

Section 1. A. Regular Members. Any public or private school within the State of Idaho that meets the accrediting standards of secondary schools as required by the State Board of Education and facility and program requirements for interscholastic competition as outlined by the IHSAA Board of Directors is eligible to become a regular member of the corporation. *In order to become a regular member of the corporation, schools must a) serve as an associate member for two years, or b) request permission to apply for direct regular membership from the IHSAA Board.* Application for membership by schools in the State must be approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors as a Final Reading at the January IHSAA Board of Directors meeting the school year prior to membership.

All applicants for regular membership in the IHSAA must meet the following facility and program requirements.

1. Facility Requirements
 - a. Demonstrate the ability to host competition and provide a safe and appropriate environment for those activities the school chooses to sponsor.
 - b. Demonstrate the ability to meet the following field and gym conditions:
 1. Meets National Federation field/court specifications (ex. – size, length, ceiling height)
 2. Playing surface – safe and adequately maintained, properly marked
 3. Crowd control capabilities – (Security barrier)
 - c. Demonstrate the ability to meet the following facility amenities:
 1. Adequate spectator seating/viewing area
 2. Available restrooms
 3. Score boards – public address system when needed
 4. Crowd control management
 5. Adequate locker room for visiting teams
 6. Adequate team areas – (sideline benches, etc.)
 7. Adequate parking for visiting team buses and spectators
2. Program Requirements
 - a. Schools seeking membership in the IHSAA that are established for the purpose of selecting students on the basis of skills and technique in an IHSAA-sponsored activity would be ineligible to compete against member schools in that activity.
 - b. **Associate Members.** Schools not meeting the State Board of Education accreditation standards are eligible to become associate members of the corporation. An associate member shall have the same privileges as a regular member except that it shall have no right to vote, shall not be entitled to participate in district or state tournaments, and shall not be entitled to championship awards.
 - c. With the payment of annual membership dues to the corporation, both classes of members agree to subscribe to the by-laws, rules and regulations promulgated by the corporation.

A motion was made to approve the Regular Membership Requirements with modifications as needed as a Final Reading.

ACTION AGENDA- FIRST READINGS

40% Playoff Format Committee Proposal

Chad Williams reviewed the proposal approved in June to move forward with the 40% playoff format. He was asked to provide a cost comparison and calculated the average travel expense for a play-in game based on mileage. He then compared the projected costs for the 2025–2026 playoff games under the current format versus the 40% playoff format. The analysis showed a statewide increase of \$176,000 (Page 30).

Under the current system, the IHSAA sponsors the games, but under the 40% format, the host school would be responsible for costs, including paying the visiting team up to 100% of their travel costs. There is currently no travel limit, but a recommendation allows teams to decline games if the seeding difference is significant. There would be no neutral officials, and the game would be considered a home game for the host school. The host school would cover the visiting team's travel costs and any related worker expenses using profits from the game. If additional profit remains after these costs are paid, the remaining amount would be split evenly between the two schools. If the proposal moves forward, related rules will need to be reviewed and rewritten.

Chad Williams discussed the 6A proposal, noting that while nearly all data from the schools supported the 40% playoff format, the 6A classification was the exception in previous discussions. This proposal has the support of nearly all 6A Athletic Directors (Page 31).

A motion was made to move the 1A-5A 40% playoff format as proposed and 6A as discussed with modifications as needed as a Final Reading.

A motion was made to move the Baseball and Softball Sportsmanship Awards for the 2026 season with modifications as needed as a Final Reading.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

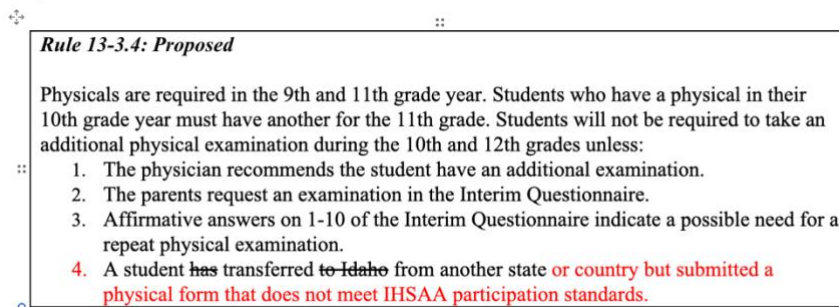
- 1. Board Priorities for Classification Committee-** Discussion was held regarding the classification petitioning timeline, and how it needs to be adjusted. To begin the process, Chad developed a priority list and will ask board members to rank the items. Once ranked, the classification committee will review them along with past proposals to create a recommendation that reflects the board's priorities. He hopes to send the list to members before September and discuss it at the next meeting. Items for consideration include an extended-boundary school multiplier (addressing situations where private or charter schools have no boundaries or significantly larger ones), whether larger boundaries should be weighted as more than one student, removal of item #10, and whether petitioning should be allowed.
- 2. Rule 10-1-6: Officials for Play-in Games-** Chad Williams shared a suggestion from Riley Jones regarding basketball officials play-in game assignments, noting that the current rule language has not been updated to reflect the use of three-person crews. While football operates under different rules with this outlined clearly, basketball's wording remains outdated. This item will remain a discussion point, pending the outcome of the 40% playoff format decision.

Rule 10-1-6: Proposed

Officials assigned to play-in games involving the sports of volleyball, football, soccer, ~~basketball~~, baseball and softball will be selected from the host district.

In the sport of ~~s of volleyball and basketball~~ if one of the schools is from the host district, the officials should be selected from the activity districts involved in the play-in game. ~~Officials from each participating district would be selected.~~ officials from a neutral district not involved in the game will be assigned whenever possible. When this is not possible due to travel or other factors, a split crew will be assigned with the higher ranked MaxPreps participating team's district providing two officials for the contest and the lower ranked MaxPreps participating team's district providing one official for the contest.

3. **Rule 13-3: Physicals for Out-of-State Transfer Students-** Chad Williams reported on an update from the Sports Medicine Advisory Council, noting that the previous wording on Rule 13-3, stated physicals from another state were not accepted. The revised language now allows out-of-state or country physicals if they meet IHSAA qualifications.



A motion was made to approve to move the proposed changes for Rule 13-3 with modifications as needed to a First Reading.

4. **IHSAA 5-Year Annual Calendar-** Chad Williams revisited the June discussion regarding multiple spring state tournaments occurring on the same weekend. The board requested a review of the calendar to explore possible adjustments. Julie Hammons explained that the calendar is built by working backward from two fixed points—Thanksgiving and Memorial Day—which determines the number of weeks in each season. Spring sports share a common start date because they all conclude on the same weekend, creating tournament overlap. Spencer Barzee suggested providing schools with viable calendar options for review. Chad will gather feedback and ideas from Athletic Directors at the upcoming administrative meetings. No action taken. (Page 32).
5. **Football Brackets-** Chad Williams discussed the Football Rules and Regulations, noting that in past years there was a statewide football scheduling meeting. He suggested shifting this to a “build your bracket” meeting instead, as reflected in the current Rules and Regulation brackets. Chad questioned whether the meeting needs to occur annually or only every other year for a new cycle, and whether the board should provide guidance for the process. Heath raised questions about how the 40% playoff format would affect the football bracket, noting safety concerns with excessive games and suggesting alignment with other sports. All classifications have 11–12 team brackets except for 5A, which has a 16-team first round. He observed that matchups between seeds 5–12 are generally competitive, but 1–16 creates a larger gap. It was recommended that 5A adjust its bracket to 12 teams, as directed at the last meeting. A proposal must be submitted by the December meeting, and Chad and Jeremy Burgess will work with 5A schools to finalize it. (Pages 33-37).
6. **Rule 10-1-2b: Annual Background Check, \$12.50/year -** Chad Williams reported that officials are currently required to complete annual background checks at a cost of \$12.50, which is more frequent than the requirements for teachers or coaches. He questioned whether yearly checks are necessary and consulted football commissioners, asking if they would be aware if an official encountered legal trouble during the year; all responded that they would. Chad suggested considering a five-year background check cycle, with a clause requiring officials to self-report if certain offenses occur. Shawn recommended seeking legal counsel and contacting the NFHS for guidance. Chad will also research how other states handle this requirement.
7. **Coaching Mental Wellness Course-** Mike Federico discussed a proposal from our office and the NFHS regarding a new course, Coaching Mental Wellness. He received positive feedback from other directors and the SAC students regarding the implementation of this new course. The course focuses on stress management and coaching tactics, rather than suicide prevention. The NFHS has removed the suicide prevention course as a

requirement and replaced it with Coaching Mental Wellness. While it may not solve all issues, Mike believes it provides useful strategies and is an appropriate replacement beginning next fall. The overall coaching requirements would remain the same, with this course substituting for the previous suicide prevention requirement.

A motion was made to place the proposal replacing the NFHS Student Mental Health & Suicide Prevention course with Coaching Mental Wellness as a required course for coaches on the Action Agenda as a First Reading for the next board meeting.

A member school had a golfer participate in a club tournament during the high school season. The golfer won the event. The golfer's photo was later published in the local newspaper. The school self-reported the violation after the article was released.

- The golfer will have to miss 2 regular schedule matches and the school will be fined. The school will have the fine reduced since it self-reported
- Fine school
- Self report is usually 75 fine if first offense
- The player would be suspended for the next two contests, and the school would be fined \$75.00.
- This would be a discussion for our Board and would probably seek guidance from the IHSAA office.
- The school would be fined an undisclosed amount and a date would be taken from the school's golf schedule
- Fine and suspension of the player for the violation.
- School would be more than likely fined \$75 for self reporting and placed on probation. The golfer may have to sit out some competitions.
- We would follow the outside competition rule as far as how many matches/tournaments the golfer would have to sit out and there would also be a fine.

A member school is late in paying its required fees.

- Will send out a reminder notice asking them to pay asap
- Fine school
- 75 if first offense some school that are new we work with
- We've sent first and second late notice to the Athletic Director. The third late notice is sent to the Principal and Athletic Director and a fourth would be sent to the Superintendent...
- Typically a fine
- Final Final Warning. Then \$150 fine
- Try to contact the AD or Principal, last resort would be to direct Commissioner not to schedule officials until fees are paid.
- The school would probably receive a \$75 fine.
- School is given a second notice that if payment is not received, then they will not have officials assigned to their games.

The school's Activities Director did not attend the annual IHSAA administrative meeting in the fall.

- There school will be fined and have the AD watch a video of the meeting if one exists
- Fine School
- Same as above- (75 if first offense some school that are new we work with)
- In the past, we have contacted the Principal and informed them of the absence.
- Typically a fine.
- \$150 fine
- Fine and a letter to the Building Principal.
- If the role is turned in which lots of times isn't the school would receive a \$75 fine.
- Fine of \$200

A member school's freshman team practiced/scrimmaged with the eighth-grade team over the holiday break. Once the error was recognized, the school self-reported the violation to the Board of Control.

- Discussion sanctions and fines to the player and school
- Fine School and take a date from them
- Same as above
- The school is fined \$75.00.
- A fine and some education on further incidents.
- Warning letter from the BOC
- Fine/Reduced by half. Scrimmage would count as a game depending on circumstances it could result in forfeit of regular game as well.
- The school would receive a \$75 dollar fine for self reporting and placed on probation.
- Follow outside competition rule and impose a fine.

A high school principal has had difficulty separating his role as an administrator from his role as a parent during their child's participation in activities. This led to negative interactions with officials. The previous year, both the principal and the school received a written warning that further incidents would lead to Board of Control Intervention. Despite the warning, another incident occurred during the basketball season.

- The board would schedule a hearing with the school admin, sanctions will be levied along with a fine
- Fine school and report it to Superintendent of Principal
- A fine and also possible suspension of the admin from games
- We would first refer the matter to the school's conference. If the conference ran it back to the Board of Control we would first involve the Superintendent and ask that they handle the matter in house.
- A large fine
- This was ours. Fined the school \$1500 (the max) and forbid admin from attending games
- Fee to the school and suspension from attending game or games depending on the incident.
- The school would be fined and the principal would be possibly banned from attending district games as well as have to go through sportsmanship training.
- While I can't speak for the Board, typically it would be a ban for the principal at athletic events involving his/her child and a fine imposed.

Students storm the court following a basketball game.

- Schedule a meeting with the schools admin, discussion sanctions, fines and how to stop this in the future
- Fine school
- We had this and we had a bigger fine of around \$300
- Fine the school \$150.00 for an IHSAA violation and ask the administration to address the matter with the student body and instruct them on the administration's expectations going forward.
- Typically a letter of reprimand and a possible fine.
- Warning from the BOC, possible fine
- I do not think we have had this type of incident that wasn't part of a fight or disagreement. I believe this would be handled specifically by the officials and game administration.
- Haven't to my knowledge ever had to deal with this issue as a board
- This one is hard to answer without any details to what occurred. Did they cause conflict? Was there a melee? Can't really answer due to lack of details.

A school played an ineligible player in five games. Upon discovering the mistake, the school self-reported the violation to the Board of Control.

- The school will be fined, the coach could be suspended, the 5 games will have to be recorded as forfeits
- Fine the school. Those five games will also be forfeited.
- 75 if self-report and first offense
- The student would be suspended for the next two contest and the school fined \$75.00 for each violation.
- This could be handled in many fashions. Letter of reprimand, forfeiture of games, a fine.
- Would assume the school would forfeit those games. If not the BOC would step in.
- Fine/Half for self-report and suspension for 5 games
- School would be fined \$75 for self-reporting, placed on probation and possibly have to forfeit games.
- The school would forfeit the games the ineligible player played in and there would be a fine imposed.

At the district drama competition, each school is responsible for providing and training two judges. A concern was raised by the drama representative that the event was delayed or could not be completed due to a shortage of judges.

- Talk to the BOC drama rep, figure out the schools that didn't provide the proper amount of judges and fine each school, send a written letter stating they need to follow the guidelines to provide judges or face not being allowed to participate in the competition
- Reach out to each school within the district. Let them know that it is mandated that they provide two volunteers.
- We started to fine schools that didn't provide judges 75
- We amended our bylaws to add a section that schools who failed to provide the assigned numbers of judges would be fined \$75.00 per violation.
- I have never run into this one. I would have to seek guidance from the IHSAA.
- The BOC would send an email out to member schools looking for volunteers. Not sure on this one.
- If this was due to a specific school not providing judges I would assume there would be a letter to the school and possible fine.
- Not sure as haven't seen this scenario before but a fine would be probably given as well as probation.
- Probably evaluate the communication given to schools about providing judges. Was there a penalty identified for not providing and how many schools did not provide. It would depend on what communication was received and the history of this possibly happening before.

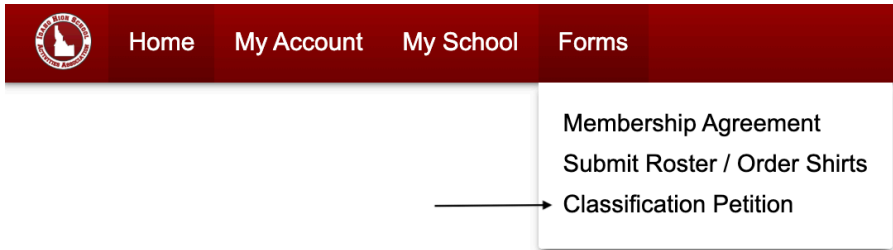

Football Sports Practice Model

The IHSAA Board of Directors has adopted the fall sports practice model for football.

Ten Day Practice Rule

Ten days of practice, in the sport, must be conducted before an athlete participates in a contest regardless of when they become a participant on the team. Helmets may be worn on the first day. Each player must have at least two (2) days of practice without any pads. Shoulder pads may be worn on the third (3rd) day and full pads on the fifth (5th) day.

Game Limitations for Each Team

No team may play more than nine games maximum for regular season play. No interschool football game will be approved unless at least five days have elapsed from the date of the previous game by that team. The term "football team" includes freshman, junior varsity, and varsity teams in grades 9-12. With approval, a team may play on the fifth day following competition.

Game Limitations for Individual

6A, 5A, and 4A football players are permitted to play a maximum of four quarters per day and five quarters per week. 3A, 2A and 1A football players are permitted to play a maximum of five quarters per day and six quarters per week provided they are not a varsity starter on offense or defense.

The week in which the five/six quarters may be played is measured from Sunday to Sunday. A student who played in two quarters of the varsity game on Friday night could play in three quarters of the JV game the following Saturday. Once a player enters the game during a given quarter, they are credited with one quarter of participation, regardless of how long they remain in the game during that quarter.

When playing two games the same day 6A, 5A, and 4A schools may request a waiver of the four quarters per day, to five quarters per day rule. 3A, 2A, and 1A schools may request a waiver of the five quarters per day rule, to six quarters per day.

A letter requesting a waiver of the one-day quarter rule must be submitted to the IHSAA. It must be signed by the principal and athletic director, that verifies:

1. There are 44 or fewer participants in the program at the 6A, 5A, 4A, 3A classifications, and 32 or fewer participants in the program at the 2A and 1A classifications, and the program desires to field two teams, or
2. There are 61 or fewer participants in the program at the 6A, 5A, 4A, 3A, classifications, and 32 or fewer participants in the program at the 2A and 1A classifications, and the program desires to field three teams; and
3. The lack of participants will cause the loss of a sub-varsity program; and
4. The lack of participants will cause the school to cancel scheduled games at the sub-varsity level; and

5. A minimum of 15 'varsity only' players must be designated for 6A, 5A, 4A, and 3A schools, and 7 'varsity only' players for 2A and 1A schools. The designated 'varsity only' players will be limited to four quarters per day in 6A, 5A, 4A, and 3A, and five quarters per day in 2A and 1A; and
6. The school's coaching staff has not, and will not, cut players or discourage anyone from participating in football, regardless of their ability.

A football player who exceeds the limitations of regular season participation will become ineligible for district, state or any other additional IHSAA sponsored competition of that sport.

Scheduling Requirements

All member schools that sponsor football are required to participate in the statewide scheduling of varsity football games in order to provide all schools a full and competitive schedule.

Football Rules

The official rules governing football in Idaho are those of the National Federation. Rule Books and Case Books must be collected and signed for by a school representative at the district rules clinic.

Eleven-Man Mercy Rule: If a 40-point differential is reached at any point during the game, the mercy rule will go into effect at the start of the fourth quarter. Once in effect, the game clock will run continuously and will only stop for injuries, team timeouts, or when a team scores.

The mercy rule does not apply to IHSAA playoff or championship games.

Eight-Man Football Rules

Eight-man football shall be played under the same rules as eleven-man football except for the rule differences as listed in the NFHS rulebook. Three certified officials are required for all eight-man football games.

Eight-Man Mercy Rule: If a 40-point differential is reached at any point during the game, the mercy rule will go into effect at the start of the third quarter. Once in effect, the game clock will run continuously and will only stop for injuries, team timeouts, or when a team scores. After halftime, if the mercy rule is in effect, the coach or administrator of the losing team may call a timeout to end the game.

The mercy rule does not apply to IHSAA playoff or championship games.

Coaches and officials from both teams are strongly encouraged to meet prior to the contest to discuss potential scenarios, especially if there is a strong possibility the mercy rule may come into play. During this pre-game meeting, they may agree to end the game once a certain point differential is reached or outline a plan of action should the mercy rule be triggered.

Resolving of Ties

Games ending in a tie must be decided using the 10-yard line overtime procedure outlined in the NFHS Rules Book, unless the outcome has no bearing on football playoff representation. In those cases, both teams must agree before the game, whether to play overtime or allow the game to end in a tie.

Safety

To help protect participants, the IHSAA recommends the following:

1. Principals and activity directors should prepare a letter instructing the football coach not to teach face tackling or butt blocking. A copy of this letter should be maintained on file at the school.
2. Coaches should include a clear description of legal blocking and tackling techniques in their player and/or coaching manuals. Head coaches are responsible for ensuring that all assistant coaches consistently teach these proper methods. Protect yourself and the integrity of the profession by emphasizing safe and legal techniques.
3. A coach or trainer should check helmets and other equipment periodically for damage or improper adjustment.
4. Participants must be informed of any reasonably foreseeable dangers. This includes clear warnings about the risk of catastrophic injuries, such as paralysis or death.
5. All game rules should be clearly identified, strictly followed, and promptly reinforced whenever violations occur.
6. Documentation is essential. Protect yourself by keeping detailed records of whom you have instructed or advised, including when, where, and how. Store these records securely and file a copy with the school administration office.

Heat Stroke

Heat stroke has caused fatalities in American football in recent years. These are preventable deaths. This information is provided to Idaho coaches and trainers as a guide for the prevention, recognition, and proper response to heat-related illnesses.

1. Acclimatization and Conditioning: The most important force operating to prevent heat stroke is acclimatization. Players should be encouraged to start workouts 14-21 days prior to the first practice session. The best single activity is running, and this should start with 20-to-30-minute workouts twice daily.
2. Proper Clothing: Jerseys should be short sleeved and lightweight. Cotton socks are recommended.
3. Fluid Intake: Fluids should always be readily available on the practice field. A manager should weigh athletes before and after every practice. Players who lose more than five pounds should rehydrate by consuming adequate fluids to replace the loss.
4. Practice: Caution should be exercised when temperatures reach 85 degrees or higher.
5. Forced Weight Loss: An athlete should never be required to wear a plastic suit while working out in the heat, whether indoors or outdoors.

Recognizing Clinical Syndromes

1. Heat Exhaustion - This condition is characterized by weakness, profuse sweating, and often headache. Cooling the individual with fans and offering small sips of fluids will typically relieve symptoms within a few minutes.
2. Heat Stroke - This condition is marked by unconsciousness and dry, hot skin, accompanied by an elevated body temperature. It is a medical emergency requiring immediate action. The patient should be cooled quickly using ice or cold cloths and transported to a hospital without delay. ***When in doubt, always treat as heat stroke.***

State Football Championship Sites

Final round games will be played at a site determined by the IHSAA Board of Directors. When possible, state championship games will be held at Idaho's three university facilities.

Prioritized Factors for Selecting Milk Bowl Sites, Dates, and Times

1. A region cannot host two years in a row unless both schools are from that region.
2. Site Availability
 - a. Idaho State University: A maximum of four games per day may be scheduled at the ICCU Dome. If possible, games should be scheduled for Friday afternoon and evening. Final game times and dates will depend on ISU's football schedule.
 - b. University of Idaho: A maximum of three games per day may be scheduled at the Kibbie Dome. If possible, games should be scheduled for Friday afternoon and evening. Final game times and dates will depend on the U of I's football schedule.
 - c. Boise State University: A maximum of two games per day may be scheduled at Don Larson / Albertson Stadium. Final game times and dates will depend on BSU's football schedule. The 4A, 3A, 2A, and 1A Milk Bowl games in District III will be played at an area high school.
3. Travel
 - a. The team traveling the farthest distance will have the first choice of game time.
 - b. No game will be scheduled to start after 9:00 p.m.
 - c. Consideration of instructional time lost by the two participating teams
 - d. Availability of lodging and meals for teams, support groups, and spectators.

The final decision in setting sites, dates and time for each Milk Bowl will be made by IHSAA representatives by 10:00 a.m. the Sunday prior to the state championship game.

Home/Visiting Team Designation for Championship Games

The team traveling the greatest distance to the site will be designated the visiting team and will wear white jerseys. This team will be assigned the largest locker room, equipped with the most showers and restrooms, and placed on the same side of the field as the press box. If both teams are from the same city, the higher-seeded team will be designated the home team. Locker room assignments, sideline placement, and student sections will be determined at the discretion of the site manager.

6A / 5A Financial Plan — Semi Final Round

All 5A and 4A games except championship games.

1. Per game reimbursement
 - a. Travel: \$3.00 per mile (one way) towards the cost of transportation regardless of number of buses a school wishes to send.
 - b. Meals and/or lodging: (1) up to 200 miles one way - \$250, (2) 200-300 miles one way - \$500*, (3) Over 300 miles one way - \$2,000.
*Any contest between District II and District III will fall into category 3 due to the type of roads.
2. Trophy and medal costs will be shared by participating schools.
3. Reasonable local expenses - if the game is held in a non-school facility, rent will be paid.
4. IHSAA will receive 15% of gate receipts after sales tax deduction.
5. If the gate receipts are not sufficient to cover the on-site expenses, the travel reimbursement will be proportionate to the income.
6. Net receipts from all semi-final games will be divided among participating schools. Each participating school will receive one share for each game it plays.
7. The IHSAA will be in control of all media rights for the rounds of 8 and 16. All media money from these rounds will be returned to the participating schools.

4A/ 3A / 2A / 1A Financial Plans – Quarter/Semi Final Rounds

In addition to the above amount, each school that travels will receive \$3.00 per mile one way for travel. Example: Moscow travels to Pocatello for final round. Moscow is 524 miles from Pocatello. Therefore, they would receive $524 \times 3 = \$1572$ for mileage. Because they are a 4A school traveling over 450 miles, they would receive \$2200 additional.

The Board has no adopted formula for division of gate revenues for doubleheaders and tripleheaders. The Board will review each on an individual basis.

Football Preliminary Playoff Sites

The Board of Directors will approve the sites, dates, and times for all football playoff games during its January board meeting. In all playoff rounds, the designation of a host team does not guarantee the game will be played on that team's home field

The host school may hold the game at its own facility or at another location that meets IHSAA state playoff requirements. However, schools must obtain IHSAA approval before scheduling playoff games at the ICCU Dome, Albertsons Stadium/Dona Larsen Park, or the Kibbie Dome.

Playoff Site Requirements

Each district Board of Control must submit a list to the IHSAA of all potential sites that meet the requirements for hosting state football playoffs.

1. Adequate parking
2. Adequate spectator seating for the following classifications:
 - o 1A: Home team: 200; Visiting team: 150
 - o 2A: Home team: 200; Visiting team: 150
 - o 3A: Home team: 400; Visiting team: 200
 - o 4A: Home team: 600; Visiting team: 250
 - o 5A: Home team: 800; Visiting team: 300
 - o 6A: Home team: 1000; Visiting team: 500
3. Appropriate number of sites for ticket sales.
4. Football playing field area prepared to meet the existing weather conditions.
5. Adequate locker rooms with restrooms and showers with handicapped accessibility. Player restrooms shall be separate from spectators.
6. Adequate number of restrooms for spectators.
7. Adequate security to maintain crowd control. Playoff site management shall take necessary measures to prohibit home team fans from being in the visiting team spectator area.
8. The football field must be enclosed by a barrier positioned at least seven yards from the out-of-bounds lines. This barrier may consist of fencing, rope, or other safe materials that do not pose a risk to spectators. It must stand at least 36 inches high and be actively monitored by game security to ensure that no fans or spectators come within seven yards of the playing field.

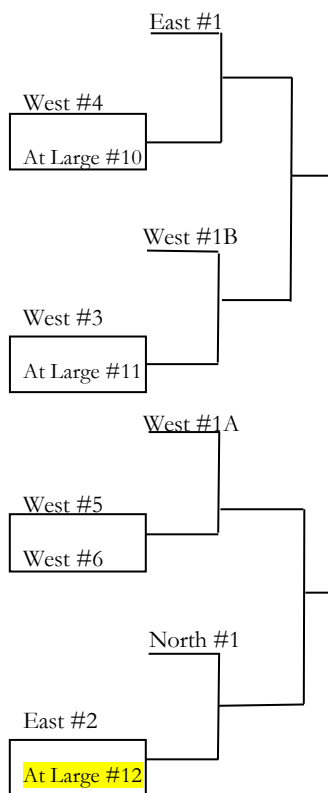
Pre-Tournament Practice

Teams are not allowed to practice in the ICCU Dome, Kibbie Dome, or Albertsons Stadium during the state playoffs, except for the championship game. For the championship, if one team has used the facility during the current season and the other has not, the team without prior access may request a practice opportunity from the tournament director. Approval is subject to facility availability, as determined by the tournament manager. If approved, practice will be scheduled only for the day before the championship game.
