Spencer Barzee moved; Randy Lords seconded to approve the agenda.

District I Representative

Chad Williams introduced Jan Bayer, superintendent of the Boundary Country School District, as the new District I Representative.

CONSENT AGENDA

Chad Williams reviewed the financials, highlighting that the contingency fund is past \$600,000 for the first time. Referring to the financial statement, he noted that the figures might not be completely accurate since the football financials are incomplete but will be finalized by the January meeting. Chad also provided updates on specific sports events. For State Cross Country, he noted an increase in income percentage compared to last year, attributed the option to charge a gate fee at Eagle Island. Swimming revenue also saw an increase due to Julie managing to get more seating. However, soccer revenue declined due to the tournament being spread across multiple locations statewide. Overall, Chad noted that the current financials are incomplete and will be finalized for the January meeting.

Tonia Burk moved; Tyler Johnson seconded to approve the consent agenda which included the Balance Sheet, Financial Report from July 1, 2024, to November 30, 2024, and the IHSAA Board of Directors action via phone or email.

REPORT AGENDA

YEA update

Julie Hammons provided an update on the YEA, noting a slight decline in the fund balance due to regular market fluctuations. She highlighted that the winter and fall jamborees are wrapping up, with participation numbers appearing higher than usual. She also reported that 82 schools are fully vested in the endowment, with a few others nearing full vestment. Julie also noted that the YEA holds life insurance policies for Myrna Jones and Bill Young. With Myrna's recent passing, they are in the middle of navigating that process.

Marketing

Zach Hoffman provided an update on marketing for the fall tournaments, noting the season as a success. He highlighted Dairy West's participation in several events, including football, volleyball, and soccer, where they handed out milk. Zach also addressed some challenges, specifically the unauthorized use and sale of state championship logos by other entities. He mentioned that he has talked with the directors to fix those issues. He also shared positive news that the Idaho Air National Guard has returned as a sponsor, increasing their sponsorship value.

Officials

Chad Williams provided an update on the officials' report, sharing that he has met with them to address updates to Rule 4-3, which is being revised based on feedback from officials and the sportsmanship committee. He noted a positive overall trend, with an increasing number of officials joining over the past three years.

State Cross Country

Chad Williams provided an update on the state cross-country tournament, thanking everyone involved. Besides the brief weather challenge and small timer malfunction, the tournament ran pretty smoothly. Regarding financials, Chad mentioned that this year's awards expenses were \$1,000 higher compared to three years ago. However, hosting the event at Eagle Island allowed gate fees to be charged, resulting in an additional \$1,000 in revenue.

State Drama

Julie Hammons shared details about the state drama event hosted at Canyon Ridge High School. She noted that 591 students from 42 schools participated, with the support of around 75 judges and coaches who worked together to make the event a success. Julie praised the event, stating that it ran smoothly and highlighted the impressive talent of the students.

State Football

Chad Williams reviewed the state football tournament and shared how thankful he was for the hard work of the tournament managers. He stressed the importance of schools entering their scores on time into MaxPreps, mentioning that one school delayed submitting their scores, which affected the seeding for two other schools. Overall, he said the tournament was successful.

State Golf

Julie Hammons provided an update on state golf, stating that the tournament was overall a success. She mentioned concerns about the future of fall golf being held on Fridays and Saturdays. Golf courses have expressed hesitation about closing for the weekend, because the \$1,200 compensation for the tournament doesn't offset their losses. She suggested that the options are to either increase the payment or move the tournament to different days in the week. For 2025, the plan is to keep the tournament Friday and Saturday, but adjustments may be made for upcoming years, potentially moving it to Monday and Tuesday.

State Soccer

Julie Hammons reported on state soccer, saying that it was a great tournament overall. She noted that one of the classifications was held at a new site in Sandpoint. She pointed out an issue with the scheduling, as boys' and girls' games were held at the same time but at different locations an hour apart, making it challenging for administrators to manage both games. She mentioned plans to host both boys' and girls' tournaments together there in the future. However, Julie pointed out that when using northern locations, there are usually smaller crowds because the majority of the schools in attendance are traveling from out of the area.

State Swim

Julie reported on state swimming, highlighting that the new process of allocating tickets directly to schools was a success and made a significant improvement compared to last year. Overall, she noted that the event ran smoothly. However, she mentioned some issues with the scoring, such as glitches in the YMCA's system and the scoring program causing errors. She emphasized the need for the YMCA to update its software. She also mentioned an increase in seating availability, with the YMCA increasing capacity from 450 seats last year to 550 this year. Of those, 25 seats were reserved for Dairy West and another 25 for coach cards. She concluded by saying the financial loss for the event was only \$900, which is a strong outcome.

State Volleyball

Mike Federico provided an update on the state volleyball tournament, noting that this year's event was spread across various locations and marked the first year of three-day tournaments. New venues included the University of Idaho and the Mountain America Center. He praised the Mountain America Center for being easy to work with and shared that they invested in volleyball standards to meet regulations. Regarding financials, Mike reported a loss of about \$30,000 for volleyball, primarily due to the use of non-high school venues with specific ticketing systems at Moscow and the Mountain America Center. Mike also shared insights on MaxPreps reports, highlighting that, for the first time, the 1–8 seeds in 6A all qualified this year, and in 5A, an 8-seed won the tournament for the first time.

SAC Sportsmanship Symposium

Mike Federico introduced Beckam, a student from Centennial High School and District 3 representative for the SAC, to provide a report on the symposium. Beckam mentioned that about eight schools attended the district 3 symposium, which he considered a great turnout. He highlighted the introduction of the "Gem State of Mind" logo and motto, and how that is being incorporated into the SAC. Overall, Beckam said the event went well and that the focus is on increasing attendance and encouraging new students to participate in the upcoming Spring summit. He also shared that a video on proper and improper behaviors is currently being made and is expected to be presented at future events.

State Sportsmanship Committee

Mike Federico shared that the sportsmanship committee met in November with a group made up of one representative from each district, officials, two students from SAC (one from a small school and one from a large school), and two parent representatives. He mentioned that they have already taken steps to make a change to Rule 4-3. He also noted that the goal of the committee is not just to review the documents and ensure they are up to date, but to look ahead and determine what should be emphasized for schools moving forward.

The Sportsmanship Committee highlighted the need for a brand, and Zach suggested that one could be sold. Because of that, the students created a brand, "Gem State of Mind, Give Everyone Their Moment." Morgan discussed the process of creating the logo with the students, emphasizing that sportsmanship is a value that applies to everyone, not just the students. They are working on getting the logo trademarked. Morgan also mentioned plans to create personalized media kits for each school to help promote the brand.

Committees

Representation

- Wresting Participation Numbers & Percentages- Chad discussed the proposal to expand girls' wrestling for the NFHS 14 in 2025, presenting data percentages and a survey that was sent out to coaches. The board instructed Chad to form a wrestling expansion committee to set benchmarks and determine the right time for expansion. He noted that the survey results showed that coaches preferred splitting classifications first before moving forward with expanding the weight classes.
- o Fall Sport Representation 25-26- Chad said that the board reviewed the percentages of the fall sport representation and double checked them to make sure they looked good.

• State Tournament

 Baseball SRV proposal- Mike discussed the proposal from the SRV to change the representation for baseball. He addressed the selection of sites, emphasizing the importance of consistency in how they are chosen.

A motion was made to move the 4A Baseball SRV proposal to an action item in the January Board Meeting to be reviewed for the 2026 baseball season.

Motion carried

- O Softball & Baseball Sites -Tonia Burk mentioned concerns about selecting baseball and softball sites and the need to explore different areas of the state, with people proposing potential locations. To ensure the best opportunities, Tonia is requesting assistance, and Julie will create a survey to gather input on what people are looking for in a site. Julie added that moving to a single site could open more venue options. She mentioned they are looking for fields with lights to enable a true double elimination format on a single field. Afterward, they plan to evaluate what a possible site rotation would look like.
- Wrestling in Moscow- Shawn Tiegs discussed the dates for the wrestling in Moscow proposal saying
 it needed to be pushed to 2028-2029 wrestling season based on the contracts that the IHSAA has for
 the wrestling tournament as well as the availability at the University of Idaho.

A motion was made to move the wrestling in Moscow proposal for the 28-29 season to an action agenda in the January meeting.

- West Side State Track Proposal- Chad Williams reported that the board reviewed the West Side State Track proposal and wanted to make some changes. So, the committee asked Chad to meet with the tournament manager to come up with some solutions.
- o **State Tournament Stat Programs MaxPreps-** Mike Federico discussed how Idaho is falling behind in stat programs compared to other states. While some sports have adopted real-time scoring, basketball still relies on older methods. He highlighted that MaxPreps offers several resources for schools looking to transition to more modern programs. One of the challenges, he noted, is that while these systems are used at the state tournament, many teams don't utilize them throughout the season. Mike stated that they will look further into potential solutions for the future.
- O Volleyball 3-day Schedule- Mike discussed how this year marked the first time a 3-day schedule was used for the volleyball tournament. One key point of discussion was the possibility of scheduling more games on day one. The main reason this wasn't done was due to travel concerns. He shared that the feedback was positive, with people enjoying Thursday's schedule, as it allowed for a showcase of each team. Mike also mentioned a proposed change to switch match 9 and match 10. However, he explained that if the winner of match 5 were to play at 9 a.m., they wouldn't play again until 7 p.m., which posed a scheduling issue. Ultimately, the committee decided to leave the schedule as it was.

Board Make-up Committee

Chad discussed that the board make-up committee is working on a proposal to edit existing IHSAA bylaws. He explained that current bylaws limit the power to board has to make changes to board make up. The committee has been meeting to determine how to adjust the bylaws, with the goal of creating limits to district representation on the board. Chad shared that there is a proposal the committee has developed, which needs to be voted on by every member school in the state. He will be emailing all superintendents about the proposal and sending out a survey on Monday, Dec. 16, 2024. The proposal will require a two-thirds majority to be approved.

Play-off Format Committee

Chad shared an update on the discussions held by the play-off format committee. The committee's primary focus is on evaluating the current 8-team brackets and exploring potential options for expansion. Chad highlighted that the 6A classification is unique and expects the committee to develop a tailored proposal for its future tournaments. For classifications 5A and below, there is consideration of adopting a 12-team bracket to better suit their needs. No final decisions have been made, but this seems to be the direction they are moving toward.

November 2024 Enrollment Numbers

Chad Williams provided an update on the November 2024 enrollment numbers for member schools, recorded by the Idaho State Board of Education. He emphasized that these figures will be used to determine school classifications for the 2026-28 cycle. Additionally, any proposals to modify the classification process must be submitted by February 14, 2025.

Schools of Excellence Fall Standings

Julie shared that the full Schools of Excellence standings are published in the fall to encourage athletic directors to review their schools' rankings. She urged all schools to participate in the program, stressing its focus on helping athletic directors track and support their athletes' academic achievements.

Rules & Regulations / By-Laws

- Rule 8-14-1- Chad Williams reported that the rule was rewritten to make it clearer and more straightforward for students, parents, and office staff to understand.
- Basketball Rules & Regulations- Chad mentioned that a section referring to the 3A classification game limit appeared in two different areas, which caused confusion. To fix this, the wording was rewritten to make it clearer and easier to understand.

Hardship Guidelines- Chad Williams shared that the board requested an update to the hardship guidelines, as the previous form stated that depression and anxiety were not considered valid hardships. The updated guidelines now allow for depression or anxiety to be considered a hardship, provided there is medical documentation from a mental health professional. He also mentioned that he will be asking athletic directors specific questions to ensure that all sections of the guidelines form are completed before it is submitted.

ACTION ITEMS-FINAL READINGS

Speech Arts Proposal

Julie Hammons discussed the proposal regarding who can file grievances at speech arts tournaments. She explained that the proposal, which passed as a first reading at the September meeting, was not well received by coaches. Coaches have put forth an alternative proposal and would like our Board to consider it in lieu of what is proposed here.

A motion was made to table the inquiring proposal until January meeting with any further rewrites as a Final Reading.

As a result, there will be a formal event at the 5A and 6A track meets, where medals will be awarded. The unified basketball expeditions will continue as scheduled on Friday during both the girls' and boys' state basketball tournaments.

Rule 5-11

A motion was made to approve the changes to Rule 5-11 as a Final Reading.

Proposed Change:

5-11 A member school and its students are not permitted to participate in contests or scrimmages which take place during the time period between district tournaments and state tournaments. Cheer, dance, and speech arts are exempt from this rule.

IHSAA Rule 2-2 Classification

Classifications shall be reviewed every two years. Grades 9-12 enrollment numbers are obtained during the enrollment year from the State Board of Education and as outlined in Rule 8-15, 16, 17. Enrollment numbers for private schools are obtained from the school principal and verified with the school's student management system. Figures are compiled during a one-year period, with a one-year grace period as illustrated below. The average of enrollment figures used in calculating classification shall not be rounded up.

Rule 7

A motion was made to move the updated Rule 7 to a final reading with modifications as needed as a First Reading.

Proposed Change

- 7-2 Cooperative sponsorship of any activity by two or more member schools are permitted in one of the following categories:
 - a. Combined Cooperative Program: Students from more than one school combine to compete as one team. The combined teams' classification is determined by combined enrollments of the member schools involved. Combined enrollment superseds all classification petitions. This program applies to football, volleyball, soccer, basketball, softball, baseball, competitive cheer, and dance. Note: Failure of a school district to provide a coach or facility will not justify approval of a combined cooperative. For 6A schools, combined enrollment cannot exceed 150% of host school's student enrollment.
 - b. Collective Cooperative Program: Students from more than one school share resources, but must compete as representatives of their home school at district and state competition. School classification remains the same. This program applies to cross country, wrestling, swimming, golf, tennis, track, the individual track event of pole vault, drama, debate and speech.
- 7-3 Cooperative programs will be in effect for a minimum of two years. Cooperative program applications are required at the beginning of each classification cycle and will be in effect for a minimum of two years. Mid-cycle applications will be accepted on a one-year basis.
- 7-4 If the combined enrollments of the schools involved in a combined cooperative program exceeds the minimum number of the next higher classification the combined cooperative team will compete at that higher classification in that activity.
- 7-5 Application process for cooperative programs:
 - a. Requests for cooperative programs shall be submitted to the IHSAA Board of Directors for The primary host school shall submit a completed application, including signatures from all participating schools' administration, to their District Board of Control for approval. Deadline for fall activities is August 1; for winter activities is October 15; and for spring activities is January 15. The Board may, at its discretion, act on applications after these dates.
 - b. The local school boards of the participating member schools must submit an official application for the cooperative program to the IHSAA Board of Directors. After approval, the District Board of Control shall submit the completed application to the IHSAA for final appropriate.
 - c. IHSAA executive staff or Board of Directors may approve cooperative programs.

Rule 8-5

Dana Facer moved; Ted Reynolds seconded to approve modifying Rule 8-5 with modifications as needed as a First Reading.

RULE 8 - INDIVIDUAL ELIGIBILITY

These rules determine a student's eligibility to participate on a school athletic team or in specific competitive activities.

NON-SPORT ACTIVITY ELIGIBILITY

Cheerleading

Students who participate in competitive cheer are subject to rules 8-1 through 8-15, with the exception of Rule 8-4, Amateur Status, 8-5 Awards, and Rule 8-11, Outside Competition. Members of cheer teams that do not compete must be regularly enrolled students at the time of participation. Non-traditional students – See Rule 8-16.

Dance

Students who participate in <u>dance competition</u> are subject to rules 8-1 through 8-15, with the exception of Rule 8-4, Amateur Status, 8-5 Awards, and Rule 8-11, Outside Competition. Members of teams that do not compete must be regularly enrolled students at the time of participation. *Non-traditional students – See Rule 8-16*.

Speech Arts

Students who participate in debate, speech and drama competitions are subject to Rules 8-1 through 8-15, with the exception of Rule 8-4 Amateur Status and 8-5 Awards. Non-traditional students – See Rule 8-16.

Music

Students who audition for All State or compete in the State Solo Contest are subject to Academic Eligibility Rules 8-1 through 8-1-5 and Enrollment/Attendance Rule 8-8-1. Non-traditional students — See Rule 8-16.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE

The official/commissioner shall issue a card report an ejection to the school's Principal and Athletic Director to the coach or school administrator when a player/coach/staff/parent/fan/spectator is ejected from a competition. The card report must be issued at or prior to the conclusion of the competition submitted within a 24-hour period of the conclusion of the competition in which the infraction occurred.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

- 1. **Students / Schools / Tournaments Comparisons-** A discussion took place regarding the locations of state tournaments, comparing the number of students, schools, and the state as a whole. The conversation focused on the ability of different districts to host tournaments, which helps explain some of the proportions reflected in the graphs. No action taken.
- 2. **New Rule 8-13-4-** A discussion was held about a new rule 8-13-4. Julie recalled that about 6-8 years ago, a similar version of the rule was proposed, which required students to disclose any prior contact with coaches they were transferring to. She noted that some of the verbiage in the current rule is outdated and may need to be revised. Julie emphasized the need to decide whether to restrict students from transferring to schools

outside their residential area if they have had prior contact with coaches there. Chad, Julie, and Mike will work on revising the rule and will present different options for consideration. The topic will remain on the discussion agenda for the next meeting. No action taken.

3. Article VII & X: Music Rule & Regulations- The IMEA has reformatted existing rules to make them more user-friendly. A motion was made to move Musi Rules-Article VII & X to a **Final Reading** at the January Board meeting.

Motion carried

4. **Rule 8-12-1-** This change would further clarify the definition of a practice. A motion was made to move Rule 8-12-1 to a First Reading in the January Board Meeting.

Motion carried

5. **Associate Membership Form-** Spencer Barzee asked the Board to make this change that would allow schools who are in the candidacy stage of accreditation to apply to be an Associate Member. A motion was made to move the Associate Membership Form to a First Reading in the January Board meeting.

Motion carried

6. Cross Country Meet Limitations- A request to increase the XC meet limitation from 8 to 9 was discussed. This would mirror what is allowed in track. A motion was made to move the Cross Country Meet Limitations to a First Reading at the Board of Directors January meeting.

Motion carried

7. **Title IX consideration for Cheer & Dance** -A discussion took place mentioning that Sandpoint used cheer and dance to meet their Title IX limitations. However, OCR stated that cheer and dance cannot be considered a sport under Title IX because they don't have enough competitions and are primarily performance-based. This issue is not limited to Idaho but is a national concern. Julie will gather more information from other states on this matter. No action taken.
