

Sally Greene - 2018 Hall of Fame Inductee



Sally Greene made a positive and significant impact as a teacher, coach, official, and administrator for more than thirty years. Sally began her career in 1981 as a teacher and coach at Grangeville High School. After five years in Grangeville, Sally moved to Moscow where she worked for seventeen years. During her tenure at Moscow High School, Sally worked tirelessly for the students and faculty while also helping the girls basketball and tennis programs grow and develop into state powerhouses.

Sally coached many successful teams. Perhaps her greatest accomplishment was leading Moscow High School girls basketball teams to four state titles in the span of five years—including three consecutive state titles in 1992, 1993, and 1994. With a career winning percentage of 72.6%, Sally was named A-2 Coach of the Year four times. Her teams were named the IHSAA Legends of the Game in 2018.

Sally also coached tennis, golf, and softball throughout her career. She was always looking for ways to get students involved in high school sports and activities and stressed the importance of hard work, sportsmanship, and humility.

In addition to her coaching and teaching responsibilities, Sally worked as a volleyball official for more than twenty years. During that time, she served as the District II volleyball commissioner and was selected to officiate the state volleyball tournament twelve times.

Sally was never one to shy away from leadership and service opportunities. She was a member of numerous professional organizations including the Idaho Athletic Administrators Association, District II Board of Control, and the Idaho Association of School Administrators. As one of the early champions of Title IX, Sally was one of the first women to earn her CAA certification.

Sally moved to the college ranks in 2007, working at the University of Idaho as the Director of Field Experiences. Sally retired in 2015. Sally likes to golf and spend time traveling now that she's retired. She has been to many national parks in the U.S. as well as Italy, France, Germany, and England.
