Describe what makes your school special?

Community School provides a positive and nurturing environment where students are known and challenged by an inspiring faculty to think critically in a collaborative close-knit community.

What inspires you to teach/coach?

I am inspired by the opportunity to pass on my passion for all sports, particularly soccer. As coaches, all we are doing is passing on the love for the game to the next generation. Sports shape lives, and the game is the real teacher.

What core values do you have for your teams?

Core values of all team sports at Community School are definitely sportsmanship, camaraderie, learning to win with dignity, and overcoming adversity. Our students learn that if you lose, you keep your head held high and are gracious in defeat. These are life lessons that will be of value long after your high school career is over and are paramount for the youth of today.

What is the most rewarding part of being a coach?

It's a gift to train everyday with our athletes and watch them excel during games and to foster friendship and embrace the respect that will last well into their adult lives. Having former players come back and comment on the positive memories they have is truly rewarding.

What are the academic and behavioral expectations for the student-athletes at your school?

Academics come first at Community School, and participation in athletics is a privilege. Our students learn to manage their time well, to be kind, and to always say please and thank you. As athletes, our students know that they represent our school and all associated with it and that they will always be under scrutiny for that reason.

What advice would you give to a new coach?

The game is for the players. Make their experience as enjoyable as possible and do not yell and scream at them; show them the respect that they deserve, and they, in return, will always find a way to impress you. An arm around the shoulder and a "well played" will always go further than you ever can imagine. Be positive, have a sense of humor, laugh with them, cry with them. They will never forget the positive influence that you have with them.



IHSAA Rule of the Month

Rule 8-16-1 NON-TRADITIONAL STUDENT

Students who are enrolled in a nonpublic school shall be allowed to enroll in a public school for dual enrollment purposes. To be eligible for athletics or specific activities in the public school, the dual enrolled student must reside with their parents and participate in the attendance area of the public school in which they reside.

Rule 8-16-1 complies with the section of Idaho Code 33-203 that provides for dual enrollment.
